

Farid (Pseudo Name), who lives in a remote village of Kurigram, Rangpur Bangladesh has found educating his child during COVID-19 to be a monumental challenge. As a farmer with a lack of electricity and no access to the internet or television, he has found it difficult to help his child with his lessons. Sometimes, teachers come to the children's homes so they can help the children with their learning, however, in many cases, they have difficulties finding the children because they are out with their parents in the rice fields.

Fatema (Pseudo Name) is working in a sub-urban area for a local NGO of Bangladesh. Her daughter and son both attend a private school and is accessing online learning several hours a day. But she finds that juggling her job with family responsibilities, gadget crisis, electricity issues and the poor internet connectivity make teaching and learning so much harder during COVID-19.

As per World Bank, UNICEF, UNESCO, these challenging experiences are happening in countries across the world, and developing and under-developing countries are in vulnerable situations. Some of the most privileged students and teachers have been able to cope with the changes after schools closed, but not the majority.






Like many countries, Bangladesh closes all the school and relevant activities since March 2020. Schools were closed throughout the entire pandemic until 12 September 2021, when they reopened again. Even now, as the world enters the last quarter of 2021, many children are facing an unprecedented second year of school closures as new variants of the coronavirus spread across the region. The associated consequences of continuous school closures are staggering and include learning loss; mental distress; school meals and missed vaccinations; heightened risk of drop out of structured education; increased, child labor; and increased child marriage. Many of these dire consequences are already affecting countless children, and many will continue to be felt in the years to come.

The future of over 40 million children in Bangladesh is at risk with their education severely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Existing evidence shows that the cost of addressing learning gaps are lower and more effective when they are tackled early in a crisis, and that ongoing investments made in education will support economic recovery, growth and prosperity.


The increased risk of dropping out of schools due to the pandemic, especially for girls and children in poor and already marginalized families, threatens to reverse progress made in school enrolment in recent decades. Special children are also







in trouble. According to UNICEF Report 2021, education budgets in the region will need to increase by an average of Ten percent to catch up with such losses if Asia is to reach the education targets of the UN 2030 Agenda's Sustainable Development Goals in the next nine years. Compare to many other countries since Bangladesh spends less on education, the challenges will be more in this regard. The data in the chart will give a clear picture about the real scenarios of Bangladesh present status.



This is well predicted that impacts stemming from Covid-19 will have long-term consequences. The lifetime income and productivity of the current age-cohort would be severely constrained if the government does not step in with bolstered short-term and long-term public policies as follows:

up the First, when opening protocols healthcare schools. should be strictly followed. Second. ensuring return to school for each student and numbers of programs need to be implemented specially for the special and distressed. Third, supplementary nutrition programs

such as the school feeding program and midday meal programs should be implemented nationally. *Fourth,* measures should be taken to reduce the digital divides across income groups as well as across regions. *Last,* but most importantly, the government must increase allocation in education in all possible ways.

Numbers of studies, economists and researcher has shown its importance and calculation in many of their researches. Otherwise the development regarding this sector was made in previous years will be unnoticed and will create huge negative impact about the success of SDG 4 that were done in previous year.

As the pandemic crisis is prolonging, such contraction in education expenditure contrasts with what this sector needs. Combating the challenges would require a stronger collaboration among all the relevant sectors along with the Government. If adequate actions are not taken now, it will be too late to mitigate it later.

As a part of long-term awareness activities program foundation has planned to launch a program named Shishupur. The main objective of this program is to aware the children specially focusing on underprivileged children on various issues related to their daily lives. Under this, it has introduced a few characters and a short awareness story. Qard e Hasana

Project Swanirbhor - By the people for the people



Swanirbhor is a Bengali word that means self-dependent. Qard e Hasana is an Arabic word. Though all loans in Islam are interest-free and Qardh al-Hasana is that interest and collateral-free beautiful loan. The pandemic teaches us a lesson of a lifetime. Foundation from the year 2020 started a program named Folon through which it started helping the destitute farmers with this loan. While working with them it also discovered apart from the farmers there are some other professionals who also need this kind of loan.

In the Islamic community, Muslims are obliged to pay a percentage, annually under Islamic law on certain kinds of property and use it for charitable and religious purposes. But in Bangladesh, using Zakat's money, people tend to purchase clothing and distribute those to the poor. This

results in momentary happiness in the destitute family but doesn't bring much development in their lifestyles. To make appropriate use of Zakat money, we initiated to create a Sustainable Livelihood project titled "Swanirbhor through Qardh e Hasana".





Swanirbhor Journey

This was first implemented by KKF in 2019 at a very small scale involving only three families to see its results. Considering its positive outcome, we held it a bit larger scale in 2020, helping 18 destitute families. Since the pandemic strikes and people's income shrunken we observed the 18 families with proper training and guidelines.

This project involves raising Zakat money and using it to create an income-generating source for destitute families. We give the breadwinner of the destitute families, a chance to become an entrepreneur and thus improve their own living standards. A loan

As an NGO for the first time in the history of Bangladesh KKF has launched a program that was never implemented by any of the organizations before. This pandemic taught us in many ways.

The family who lost their everything during this pandemic their numbers are not very less. KKF launched an interest-free program named **Swanirbhor** under which it is going to help and provide people interest-free loan for sustainable livelihoods.

On the inaugural and launching day Chief Advisor Mr. Mahin Mazher, Senior Advisor Ms. Esha Mahin and Executive Director Ms. Sifat was present and distributed the money among the beneficiaries. The program officially started its journey from November 2021.

The projects are being implemented in: Dhaka, Erendabari, Jamalpur, Keraniganj, Tongi and Gazipur.











Project U-Turn



While aiding out marginalized communities affected by the COVID-19 foundation worked for an organization named 'Bachte Chai', which is operated by an ex-floating sex worker at present who is an activist and working dedicatedly for the struggling mobile sex workers of Dhaka City.

The growing concerns for floating sex workers made them rethink their profession, eventually being pulled back after superstitious hypes of risk factors and other perks. Here is the point where KK Foundation intervenes, driving them to quit the labyrinth to secure a brighter tomorrow for them and their children.

Our expertise team immediately formulated a 180-degree plan- and launched a project named *Project U-Turn* under its Qard e Hasana Program. The main objective of this program is to work with those sex workers who

desperately want to move out from the profession but because of the taboo or social circumstances or for the external forces failing to do so and incorporate them with respected livelihoods. Foundation is giving the priority more to those who have children or who are very new in the profession. It also has a plan to rehabilitate their children in its Joy Shokol Shishur Program and will train the mother in numbers of areas along with job opportunities.

Implementing Plan



We have conceptualized and planned a campaign of rehabilitating eight floating sex workers & managing a new profession for them, along with keeping their children in a shelter home and taking the full responsibility of their guardianship until they attain

the age of maturity. Foundation is also creating a cycle for floating sex worker mothers, through which the interested individuals shall be entertained with the gateway out of this profession and a better future for their children.

Project U-Turn through Tailoring Entrepreneurship





The course is for 2 months containing 40 classes and practical sessions. An assessment is also done at the end of the training. During the session, participants receive lunch

and transport facilities in required cases. Till date, fourteen participants received the training and work in their desired places.

We established a training center equipped with number of tailoring supports and facilities. The package includes sewing training and a particular workplace- for each of them. A professional trainer is training the participants and at the end of the training successful trainee receives job opportunity either in tailoring shop or in garments factories.

An equipped training center is set up. The plan includes creating every necessary support needed to smoothly operate the center- distributing lunch to beneficiaries in session days is one of the examples.
